The crossroads of life are abundant. Through the divergent pathways that our choices create, identities are developed that impact ourselves and our surroundings. Knowingly or unknowingly, from our lifestyle the butterfly effect matriculates, and we truly have a felt presence in the world!

What then will be our foundation? What will be the motivation and benchmark for our decisions when we reach the daily and abundant crossroads of life? Who are you, and how do you affect the world?

It must be understood that we are not simply reactionary beings that "live in the moment," free of innate or learned experience. What separates mankind from the rest of God's creation is that we have been created *in His image and likeness* (Genesis 1:26), with the reality of free choice, rather than simple instinct. We may choose our direction at the crossroads. What will we base our decision upon?

The chosen pathways of our lives reflect our developed identities. How do others identify us? How do we identify ourselves? Regardless of developed identities, we are honored with one identity that has not been developed through our

choices, but rather was given to us, even prior to our conception (Jeremiah 1:5) – we are *children of God* (1 John 3:1)! The pilgrimage of faith is a journey of equating our developed identity to our given identity. The choices that we make must be rooted in a foundation that is vested in our true experience as God's children – motivated and directed at crossroads by His Son, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The Incarnate Word, has taught and provided a foundation by which we may actualize our true identity, His Gospel Life!

A chosen lifestyle (John 14:6) honors our true identity and provides us with divinely-navigated balance through the crossroads, improving our lives and offering manna of various forms to those around us in ways that are both known and unknown. By choosing Jesus Christ as the foundation and motivation of life, we choose authentic life! The authentic life is bound by nothing and leads to eternal bliss. A life in Christ shines radiant beams of hope, reconciliation and love to the world, which otherwise is confused with darkness. With courage and conviction, we may choose life on a daily basis – truly improving ourselves and the world around us!

If you have lived by another foundation and journeyed down alternative pathways of life, do not stay away – the love of God for His

children is super-abundant, as is His mercy. Choose Him now, manifest in a committed life in His Church, and your new life will be glorious.

In these Lenten days leading to the celebration of the Lord's Resurrection, through the journey prescribed by the Church, take advantage of the opportunity to further affirm the identity given to you by God, by a lifestyle choice of true life – the lifestyle choice of Jesus Christ! Be courageous! Choose the Gospel as your foundation and motivation by which you will navigate the crossroads of life! Sanctify your soul and improve the world around you!

In March, HOPE and JOY kids took a trip to Calistoga to visit the sisters at the Holy Assumption Monastery. The sisters received us graciously and with much Christian love and warmth. The kids enjoyed meeting the sisters and learning about the many animals that have come to live at the monastery. There are several parrots who talk and squawk, some furry rabbits and a pond of amazing, colorful koi fish who love to eat Cheerios and will let you pet them! The grounds are peaceful with lovely gardens and a rustic chapel. We joined the sisters in prayer for the sixth hour and learned a lot about the chapel. There were icons of many Russian saints and some Greek saints and some icons that came several hundred years ago from Russia when Fort Ross was established. Some of the icons even contain relics of saints! The children asked many questions about our Faith and about the animals and the monastery; it was beautiful to see their excitement and interest as we toured the monastery. They learned that the sisters all take turns doing different jobs from tending to the gardens, the animals, singing in church, volunteering across the street at the local school as classroom aides, praying for all people many times a day, and cooking and cleaning at the monastery. We joined the sisters for lunch, and we all had excellent fellowship and conversation. The sisters were delighted by our visit and have invited our group to come again. We hope to plan a return visit this summer, so if you were not able to join us keep an eye open for a summer date to visit the monastery again.

Community Hall Discussion

In March, we continued our experience of Community Hall discussion, and explored the topics of: *The Experience of Great Lent & How We Respond to God*. I am very thankful for these opportunities to communicate and further develop our communication and connect as a parish family. The following is a reflection of our discussion:

The Experience of Great Lent

- ⇒ What comes to mind when we think of Great Lent?
 - o Fasting
 - o Almsgiving
 - o Jesus
 - o Reading Scripture
 - o Dedicating ourselves to God
- ⇒ Each reflection is experiential, not philosophical or conceptual.
- ⇒ Are any of these unique to Great Lent?
 - o No – these experiences are consistent throughout the year.
 - Therefore, Great Lent does not invite anything new from us.
 - Great Lent is an invitation to have greater focus & experience on the things that we are called to throughout the year.
- ⇒ Greater focus & experience is invited as we come closer to the celebration of great events.
 - o The Lord's Resurrection
 - o The Lord's Nativity
 - o Feast Days, etc...
- ⇒ Greater focus & experience edifies the celebration.

How We Respond to God

- ⇒ We have a relationship with God that was initiated by Him.
 - o Stating that we respond to God, presupposes that He has acted first – we must be responding to something.
 - o God created us
 - o God has given us everything that we have, summed up in three categories: time, talent, treasure.
 - Time: God has given us our life and determines its duration.
 - Talent: God has given us our natural talents and the ability to develop them.
 - Treasure: God has given us 'things,' including the money in our possession – whether we received it' or 'worked for it,' God has given us the ability to do so.

- o Grace: what we receive from God
 - Grace is free
 - Grace is a gift
 - Grace cannot be earned -- if it could, it would be compensation... a very different concept.
- ⇒ By design, not default, we respond to what God has given us by how we choose to use it.
 - o Stewardship: response to God's grace.
 - o Everyone has receive grace from God, therefore, everyone is offering stewardship because everyone is responding to God by the way they live their life – the life that God gave them.
 - The question is not if you are a steward...
 - The question is if you are a responsible steward.
 - Are you a good steward or a bad steward?
 - o The benchmark of determining good stewardship is the Bible.
 - We choose to live by the Gospel Message or we do not.
 - The Bible gives us standards of what to do with our time, talent, and treasure.
 - o What if we have not responded well up to this point?
 - Refer back to the standard (The Bible), and see Jesus' first public teaching – Repent. Which means to realign yourself with the Gospel message.
 - You can choose to be a good steward today.
- ⇒ When we offer back to God responsible stewardship – He increases the grace that He gives us.

HOLY WEEK

Throughout the year we eagerly anticipate the experience of Holy Week, as it so appropriately shepherds us to the celebration of the Lord's Resurrection. Intellectually, emotionally, physically, and spiritually, Holy Week delivers us to Pascha in beautiful form when we choose to experience these days to the best of our ability. The following are two announcements with regard to Nativity's journey of Holy Week this year:

1) **Holy Friday Retreat** – we look forward to continuing the beautiful experience of our youth retreat on Holy Friday, which will take place between the services of the Royal Hours and the Taking Down from the Cross. In addition, **this year we will add the experience of adult retreat to Holy Friday.** During the same hours, Father Luke will lead adults in discussion and reflection on the substance of this most solemn and holy day. Lunch will be provided.

2) **Holy Wednesday** – We will experience the 4th Bridegroom Service, Holy Wednesday Evening. As we celebrate the Bridegroom services Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday evenings during Holy Week, we will also celebrate Wednesday evening in preparation of honoring and celebrating the Last Supper of our Lord, in the Divine Liturgy the following morning. **We will still celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Unction.** Unction Service will take place at 3:00 pm, and all families are encouraged to bring their children directly from school, so that as a family you may be anointed with the Holy Unction, and receive Sacramental healing. For those who will not be able to attend the 3:00 pm Holy Unction Service, in the context of the evening Bridegroom Service, the faithful will have the opportunity to be anointed. Therefore, on Holy Wednesday, the following schedule of service will apply:

9:30 am	The Liturgy of the Pre-sanctified Gifts
3:00 pm	The Sacrament of Holy Unction
7:00 pm	Bridegroom Service (with anointing of Holy Unction)

A Lenten Message from Saint John Chrysostom

if anyone is devout and loves God, let him commence this radiant fast with joy!

If anyone is a wise servant, let him, rejoicing, enter into the school of repentance.

We who have wallowed long in sin, let us now begin our return.

If anyone has strayed from the first hour, let him today repent with zeal.

If anyone has sinned from the third hour, let him with gratitude embrace the fast.

If anyone has fled God from the sixth hour, let him have no misgivings about his prompt return;

because he shall in nowise be turned away therefore.

If anyone has indulged the works of the flesh since the ninth hour,

let him draw near, fearing God alone and trusting in His mercy.

And if anyone has turned away only at the eleventh hour, let him also not hesitate to turn back to God with haste.

For the Lord, who is longsuffering and full of compassion and mercy, will accept the last even as the first.

He restores him who repents at the first hour, as He does him who turns back at the eleventh.

He shows mercy upon the last, and cares for the first;

To the one He gives, and upon the other He bestows gifts.

He both accepts the confession, and welcomes the intention, and honors the contrite heart and rejoices in the repentance.

Wherefore, enter all of you into the holiness of your Lord; Offer your repentance, both the last, and likewise the first.

You rich and poor together, repent, for today we stand outside the closed gates of paradise.

You sober and you heedless, prostrate yourselves before your King!

Return to the Lord today, both you who have sinned with knowledge and those who have done so in ignorance.

Your pantries are full; empty them to the hungry.

The belly enslaves us; let no one be dominated thereby.

Enter all of you into the Great Fast;

Stripped of heavenly wealth by sin, let us all draw near to God's rich loving-kindness!

Let no one despair in his sinfulness, for the Bridegroom comes in the midst of the night.

Weep all of you for your iniquities, and draw near to the life-giving Cross of our Lord.

Let no one put confidence in the flesh, for the Devil has deceived us all thereby, and therewith enslaves us to sin.

By turning from God, we are made captives.

We have called good evil and evil good, and put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter.

And Isaiah, foretelling this, did cry out: Woe to those who put darkness for light, and light for darkness!

We are embittered, for we are banned from Eden.

We are embittered, for it is we who have mocked God.

We are embittered, for now we shall surely die.

We are embittered, for we have succumbed to the Serpent.

We are embittered, for we are bound by the chains of sin.

We partook of a fruit, and met the Deceiver.

We were entrusted with paradise, but we chose hell.

Our eyes were opened to see the nakedness of our sin.

Be pleased, O Lord, to deliver us!

O Lord, make haste to help us!

This is the acceptable time, let us repent!

This is the day of salvation, let us crucify the passions!

The end is at hand and destruction hangs over us!






