### What's New about the New Testament?

December 2013

*"God Himself will be with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people. God Himself will be with them and be their God. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes; there shall be no more death, nor sorrow, nor crying. There shall be no more pain, for the former things have passed away. Then He who sat on the throne said, 'Behold, I make all things new.' And He said to me, 'Write, for these words are true and faithful.' And He said to me, 'It is done!'"*

Revelation 21:3-6

Written almost 2000 years ago, and often found covered with dust on a bookshelf, it is challenging for many to look upon the New Testament as offering anything *new*! What is it that makes the New Testament new and pertinent in the lives of people yesterday, today, and forever?

In the Apostle Paul's letter to the Hebrews, he refers to the constant, never-changing experience of Jesus Christ, Who "...is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8)." God does not change. Inasmuch as God is unchanging, mankind is quite the opposite. By design mankind is in constant transition through our experience of free will. We choose the capacities and actions of our lives, not only evoking continuity in our lives, but also provoking differentiation in the environment and lives of those around us.

This continuity brings change into our experience, but it does not necessarily bring forth *newness*. All too often lives in perpetual motion are witnessed, sadly growing toward nothingness, simply busy creating void. What then creates purposeful newness?

The message of Scripture conveys a simple and profound reality: with faithfulness in God, good things happen – with faithlessness in God, bad things happen. With the message of the New Testament, the *good things* become exceedingly more accessible; through Jesus Christ we are provided *newness* that brings the experience of God into your daily life. This experience of God is what the beloved Saint John writes about in Revelation as making all things new. With divine rejuvenation we move on from all experiences of darkness and pain, and move into the Light of eternity.

How do we experience this newness? We must experience Jesus Christ.

Christ, the Living Water Who makes all things new, has made Himself present and available for us. God is not bound by any limitations, and He may make Himself available to us any way that He wishes, yet there are capacities through which He has already established mediums of His active presence.

1) Reading Scripture – Jesus Christ is the incarnate *Logos* (Word) of God. When we read the Scriptures, we approach Jesus Christ.

2) Participation in the Sacramental Life of the Church – through participation in the Mysteries of the Church, the active presence of God becomes tangible through our union with Him.

3) Living Love – Saint John the Beloved writes, "*God is Love*" (1John 4:8). When love is actively chosen in daily life, we invoke the presence and activity of the Holy Trinity.

These three chosen experiences of Christianity provoke the newness that all of mankind truly needs. Through the person of Jesus Christ, God made Himself even more accessible to His creation, so that we may become new, not simply changing.

In these sacred days, let us continually offer praise and doxology to our Benevolent Lord for His presence and our newness!

Christ is born! Glorify Him!

## **Nativity's North Star Ministry**

Over the last four consecutive Sundays following the Divine Liturgy, an experience called "The North Star Ministry" has been discussed.

The star seen in the icon of the Nativity is the very star referenced in Holy Scripture as illuminating the way to the infant Lord. Jesus Christ Himself was the destination, and the star illuminated the pathway to Him. Those who recognized and committed to this journey were deemed as "wise." The three wise men from the East, who followed the illumined path to Christ, made this journey because they knew that the experience of Jesus Christ would edify their lives.

Upon completion of their journey, the three wise men found the experience that addressed their true needs -- they found the experience of the Lord.

The Lord, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, is present and found in the life and experience of the Orthodox Christian Church! Jesus Christ is as present in the life and experience of Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Christian Church as He was in Bethlehem 2000 years ago!

Now, where is the illumined pathway that leads to 1110 Highland Drive?

Collectively, and as individuals, we must be the source of light that illumines the pathway to Christ at Nativity, just as the star did 2000 years ago. The Light of God fills us at each Divine Liturgy, and from Sunday morning we have the opportunity to reflect that Light into the world around us -- always pointing the way back to the source of Light... to Jesus Christ, Who we find at Nativity of Christ, the same way that the angels, animals, shepherds, and wisemen found Him 2000 years ago in a manger.

To allow the Light of God to illumine from us, we must do the following with the unpretentious love of God:

1) Make Contact -- approach a family member, a friend, a neighbor, a stranger and make contact with them. No Christian exists in isolation!

2) Communicate -- after having made contact with someone, be conscientious as to what is being communicated through our connection. Communication always takes place, intended or unintended, verbal or silent, conscious or unconscious. Consciously communicate the love of God!

3) Develop Relationships -- no two relationships are the same, however, for Christians the foundation of the relationship must be consistent -- the Love of God. Through your intended contact, and conscientious communication, develop relationships with those around you that are built upon the experience of Jesus Christ...that are built upon Love.

Remember the message of the great Cappadocian Fathers of the Church... "Preach the Gospel at all times, yet only when necessary use words."

Through our Christian experience of Contact -- Communication -- Relationships, the pathway to Christ will become illumined. All should yearn for the experience of Jesus Christ. When an individual feels that experience through one of His faithful (that means you!), the individual will innately be drawn to its source. Remember, the source is God Himself, Who is found in "the Nativity Cave" of Novato at 1110 Highland Drive; as individual faithful we serve as conduits of God's love -- delivering It as we continually receive It in the life of the Church.

Be the fixture that delivers the Light of God to another, and do it today! Make contact, communicate, and develop a relationship, for such glorifies God!

## **Be Wise as Magi!**

In the Biblical account of our Lord's Nativity, the path-way to Christ was illumined by a star, and those who recognized it and committed to the path are called wise – the three wisemen! These wise men from the East, who we call Magi, came to the presence and experience of Jesus Christ, and upon glorifying the infant Lord made a prepared offering to God – gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

In the same tradition, all those served by the Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Christian Church have the same opportunity to become wise in the eyes of God!

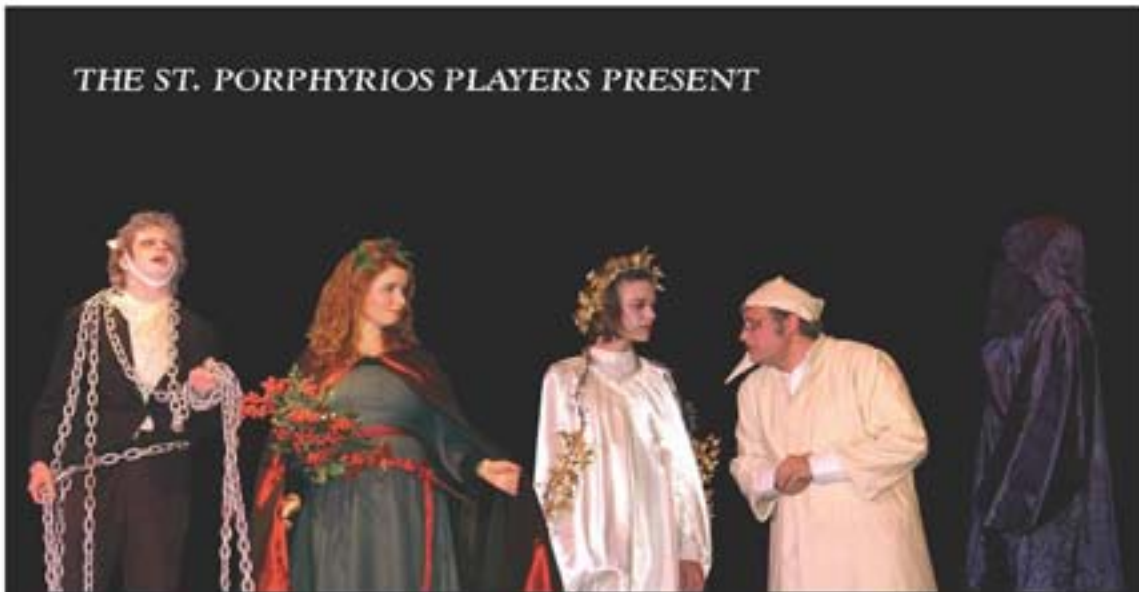
