New Means That There Is An Old

The New Year has now dawned, and we are eagerly anticipating glories envisioned in 2014. When future experiences are passionately anticipated, it is often in response to disappointments from past and present experience. The very anticipation of *new* is rooted in our perceptions of *old!*

In the months of November and December our Adult Religious Education program has explored this experience of *new & old* through our examination of the Old Testament, and the New Testament. The reality of the Incarnate Logos of God, His Crucifixion, and Resurrection can only be understood as amazingly new through the lens of what we term: The Old Testament. The New Testament is only *new* because of the *old*.

The anticipated newness of 2014 will only yield fruit when our perception of 2013 and before are genuinely derived and embraced. Simply put, it is great that you are excited about 2014, but it

will only end up being great if you are honest with yourself about your past and present – otherwise you are wasting your time.

Past experiences set the table for who we are today. How we see ourselves today will dictate who we choose to be tomorrow.

Up until this moment we may look at both successes and failures in our individual histories. Authentically, in the chapters of our life histories, in the moments that we are truly joined to Christ, we find "success." Inversely, in the moments that we live life separate from God, we witness the saddest forms of "failure." In our approach to the anticipated future, embracing the past allows us to navigate the future: taking ownership of history, holding steadfast to experiences of faithfulness and utilizing the moments of faithlessness as boundaries for future life decisions. This pilgrimage inclines the pilgrim's progress, taking advantage of the anticipated new chapters of life, rather than simply professing them in vain.

Embracing history means that we must engage it. We must have a willingness to honestly look at who we are through a lens of self-examination pointed at our past. This applies to individuals, communities, institutions, nations, cultures, etc... Intuitive are the words of the 18th C. Irish statesman, Edmund Burke, "Those who don't know history are destined to repeat it."

Inasmuch as history is important to individuals, it is also paramount to the Church. Although the essential mission of the Church does not change, as *Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever* (Hebrews),

the expressions of that mission exist in a consistent state of living continuity – interacting with dynamics of the present, and engaging potential variable beholden to the future. Yet, before the Church may most appropriately define today and engage tomorrow, we must have appreciation for yesterday.

In the month of January, the Nativity Religious Adult Education Program will explore the topic of Church History. Select periods of Church History will be discussed in the greater effort to help facilitate a healthy approach of the Church's present and future.

I pray that as individuals and the collective Body of Christ, that we will honestly engage years past so that we may legitimately engage 2014!

May our Incarnate Lord bless us all on our pilgrimage of faith! Happy New Year!
