To offer thanks is a very spiritual moment! It is not only an affirmation of your appreciation, but an extension of gratitude to the source of your appreciation. In the moment of authentic thanks, love and stewardship are experienced as we offer back to the source of our blessing with an appreciation for something other than ourselves.

How appropriate that in our country's initial formation the offering of thanks was established as foundational, even to the point of becoming a beloved national holiday. And how intuitive to recognize the abundance of American experience was beheld after the experience of giving thanks. What spiritual moments in the life of our Nation -- to formally dedicate an experience of love and stewardship, ultimately to God, Who is the initial source of all blessings. This was recognized by our founding fathers and should be encouraged to each and every one of us... the very same recognition that all our blessings come from our Father Who is in Heaven, and we have a responsibility to offer thanks!

In the same way that our faith must be made manifest in actions, our offering of thanks must become tangible if it is to be considered authentic. If we recognize and express appreciation

for the multiple forms of grace that God has gifted us, then we are obligated to do something with that grace. Giving thanks is step #1, steps #2, 3, 4, etc, all demand that we apply that which we appreciate in a way that glorifies God. For example, if you have been blessed with a beautiful singing voice:


- 1) thank God for it;
- 2) develop your singing ability;
- 3) use it to sing in church during the divine services;
- 4) perhaps use it to sing your children lullabies;
- 5) etc., etc., etc...

When we develop the process of offering true thanks, we have the ability to positively impact the world around us! We have witnessed that as a Nation, however, as the faith we have witnessed it throughout the history of God's creation. From Genesis through Revelation we witness the beauty of giving thanks. From the time of the apostles until today we have witnessed the affect of giving thanks. Now, in this season of thanksgiving, let us consciously choose to continue this spiritual tradition, and witness the total process of giving thanks by actualizing it in our daily lives.

May our Heavenly Father, Who bestows all forms of grace and is the source of all blessings, receive our thanks as humble stewards and increase His grace in our individual lives, the life of our Church, and the world around us.

I pray that this year we will enjoy and experience a true and authentic season of Thanksgiving!




Lenten Acolyte Robes

Serving the Church as a Member of the Parish Council

The following excerpts from the Uniform Parish Regulations and other pertinent material from our Archdiocese, offer us the guidelines necessary in determining qualified candidates for service on the Parish Council of our parish. Please bear them in mind as you consider nominating a fellow parishioner or offering your own name in nomination.

AIMS AND PURPOSES OF THE PARISH

"The aims and purposes of the Parish are to keep, practice, and proclaim the Orthodox Christian Faith pure and undefiled."

"The diakonia (ministry) of the Parish will include proclaiming and teaching the Gospel in accordance with the Orthodox Faith; sanctifying the faithful through God's grace in worship, the Divine Liturgy, and the other sacraments; enhancing its parishioners spiritual life; and adding to the numbers of the faithful by receiving persons into the Church through instruction, baptism, and/or chrismation. In addition, the Parish shall establish educational and philanthropic activities to foster the aims and mission of the Parish and to edify its parishioners in the Faith and ethos of the Church. The Parish shall also engage in such inter-Orthodox, ecumenical, and interfaith activities as are consistent with the policies of the Archdiocese."

(Uniform Parish Regulations, Part Three, Article 15, Sections 2 and 4)

PARISHIONERS

"Orthodox theology teaches that the Church is the Body of Christ (I Cor. 12:12-31). The characteristic of a healthy body is that every member performs its own function for the good of the whole. However, unity does not mean uniformity, and therefore within the Church there are differing gifts and differing functions. Every one of them is a gift of the same Spirit and designed, not for the glory of the individual members, but for the good of the whole.

"It is correct that the voice of the laity be heard in the Church. However, there must be a clear understanding of roles, prerogatives and limits. Only believing and worshipping lay persons should be permitted to assist in the governing of the Church; nominal and uninformed Christians should at all costs be excluded from governing roles."

(From the "Report to His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos Concerning the Future Theological Agenda of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese")

"Every person who is baptized and chrismated according to the rites of the Orthodox Church is a parishioner. The religious, moral, and social duties of a parishioner are to apply the tenets of the Orthodox Faith to his/her life and to: adhere to and live according to the tenets of the Orthodox Faith; faithfully attend the Divine Liturgy and other worship services; participate regularly in the sacraments; respect all ecclesiastical authority and all governing bodies of the Church; be obedient in matters of the Faith, practice and ecclesiastical order; contribute towards the progress of the Church's sacred mission; and be an effective witness and example of the Orthodox Faith and Traditions to all people."

(Uniform Parish Regulations, Part Three, Article 18, Section 1)

WHAT IS A PARISH COUNCIL?

"A Parish Council is a body of practicing Orthodox Christians sacramentally in good standing with the Church, elected by the members of a parish for the purpose of working together with the priest in fulfilling the goals and needs of that parish. This brief description of a local governing body also describes the fundamental structure of the Orthodox Church. That is, that we, as clergy and laity together, are the "People of God", seeking, to the best of our human capabilities, and with the grace of God, to fulfill the mission entrusted to us by our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ."

(Welcome to the Parish Council, A Guidebook for Parish Council Members)

DUTIES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

"The members of the Parish Council shall attend the Divine Liturgy regularly and participate in the sacramental life of the Church, thereby setting an example for the Parishioners."

(Uniform Parish Regulations, Part Three, Article 29, Section 1)

ELECTIONS OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

"A candidate for the Parish Council must be a member of the Parish for at least one (1) year immediately preceding the date of the election, and must live his or her life in accordance with the Faith and canons of the Church."


"All candidates shall attend a seminar conducted by the priest, prior to the election, at which the priest shall discuss and explain to the candidates the Uniform Parish Regulations, and the significance of the affirmation of office. At the conclusion of the seminar all candidates must sign a statement acknowledging that they understand the Regulations and will abide by them and the affirmation of office. If a candidate for the Parish Council does not attend a seminar and sign the statement, his/her name shall be deleted from the list of candidates."

(Uniform Parish Regulations, Part Three, Article 25, Sections 2 and 3)

NOMINATION FORM

The enclosed nomination form is sent to you for the purpose of nominating and/or placing your name into nomination for service on the Parish Council beginning January 2013. **All eligible nominees are required by the Uniform Parish Regulations to attend a Parish Council Seminar before their name can be placed on the ballot. Those unwilling to attend will be ineligible to run.**

Members of the parish eligible to nominate and/or to be nominated, and/or to place their names in nomination, are all men and women of the parish **who are practicing Orthodox Christians, sacramentally in good standing with the Church, and who have fulfilled, or are current with, their pledge for 2012. In accordance with our Parish By-Laws, to be considered current with their pledge, members must have paid a total amount on their pledge which is at least equal to one-twelfth (1/12) of their annual pledge times the number of months passed in the current calendar year. Also, to be eligible to vote at the assembly, members must have submitted their completed pledge card 30 days prior to the day of the parish assembly. In addition, those eligible to be nominated are parishioners who apply the tenets of the Orthodox Faith to their life and activities and attend the Divine Liturgy faithfully on Sundays.**



The Christmas Advent Season Begins November 15

The Coming of The Lord

For forty days the Church seeks to prepare us for the true meaning of Christmas. Most of us need time to prepare for special events. It takes time to plan for a trip, a vacation, for entering college, for a baptism or a wedding. We need time to anticipate, to prepare for the practical aspects, to think about their significance for us. With adequate preparation we enjoy these events much more.

During the liturgical year the Church has several periods of preparation prior to great feast days. The first such period begins on November 15, the Christmas Fast, which is not as strict as Great Lent prior to Easter. For forty days we anticipate and prepare for the coming (Advent) of Christ into the world and into our lives. How will you prepare for Christmas this year?

Some Practical Advice

As part of your preparation for Christmas, resolve to give closer



attention to the Word of God by reading, for example, one chapter a day from the Gospels for the Forty-Day Advent Season. You might read the Gospels of Mark and Luke, which together have forty chapters. Getting to know more about the life of Christ will make you appreciate more deeply the significance of His coming, which we celebrate on Christmas.

In your daily prayers include thanksgiving for the Lord's coming, invite Him to be at the center of your life and let your heart leap for joy as you meditate on God's gift of His Son to the world.

Make attendance at the Divine Liturgy a priority.

Participate in the Sacrament of Penance (Confession), and through repentance, prayer, and fasting renew your commitment to Christ in preparation to receive Him in Holy Communion.
