### Happy New Year!

January 1st marks the beginning of the calendar year and commonly begins with gatherings of friends, celebrations, and the establishment of new commitments -- *turning over a new leaf!*

September 1st marks the beginning of the Ecclesiastical year and is initiated by the Church with the Feast Day of the Indiction and celebrated with the Divine Liturgy -- again, a gathering of people, celebration, and establishment of commitment.

What then is the difference between the Church New Year and the Calendar New Year?

#### *The Gathering:*

January 1st gatherings are typically composed of familiar friends and family, most of whose company you look forward to, complemented by a few titled as obligatory! Other than the black sheep that was forced to attend, everyone attends voluntarily with a hope of enjoyment. The group is usually light-hearted and focused on a joyful respite during a day off of work.

September 1st invites a gathering at God's House, where those in attendance have a common faith that brings them together to give thanks to God for all of His gifts and further request that He continue to give to us. The individuals at this gathering come voluntarily because they want to. They arrive from various diverse backgrounds, yet are united in their belief and connection in God.

#### *The Celebration:*

January 1st BBQ, a cold drink, chips, salsa, college football, and if it's not too cold, a lawn game or two -- that is a great day! Whether potluck or not, the New Year's feast is usually bountiful. The day often revolves around the meal, as witnessed by the large group revolving around the BBQ or sampling

at the kitchen island. Games on TV, games in the toy room, or games in front and back yards complement the meal, and hopefully through the food and activities, something is offered for everyone. Some just stop by for a short visit, and some stay the entire day.

September 1st, the celebration is the Divine Liturgy. Surrounded by a community of common focus and need, once again this celebration is centered on the meal that is to be offered. Every word and movement leads up to the offering and reception of this meal, when Holy Communion is offered to the people, not simply addressing an appetite but rather the need of the soul. The experience of God is the result of this celebration, manifest in the healing of souls, the strengthening of pilgrimage, and the authentic occurrence of love. Specific to this celebration, the meal is complemented by enticement to all five senses: icons, architecture, gold, silver, woodwork, vestments, and fellow brothers-and-sisters-in-Christ all are *seen*. Hymns of praise are sung by fellow participants in the celebration and are *heard* by all. Icons are kissed, books are held, and at times fellow gatherers are embraced in our experience of *touching*. Incense is *smelled* from the moment that we enter the gathering space, and of course we *taste* when we receive the Holy Eucharist. The celebration is epic, affecting those in attendance at all substantive levels by providing for them what they truly need -- all in just over an hour!

#### *The Commitments:*

January 1st is synonymous with resolutions when individuals proclaim, either out loud or to themselves, new commitments that they are establishing for the new year. Whether addressing relationships, exercise, work, etc., typically New Year's resolutions are in response to some sort of behavior that the individual regrets and wants to change.

September 2012

September 1st commitments stemming from the gathering of the Divine Liturgy also propel individuals to change past behaviors from either years, weeks, or even minutes ago. When the celebration is experienced and the individual receives Holy Communion, a *clean slate* is received, as God has cleansed the soul and healed the individual. From that point on every decision is a new commitment that attempts to either nurture or neglect the gift of sanctification that God has provided.

#### *What is the Difference?*

Both New Year's events are positive and deserve a space on our calendar. Gatherings of fellowship, celebration, and the establishment of commitments are all positive when established in healthy regards. Yet, the September 1st Ecclesiastical New Year provides through the life of the Church an opportunity to substantively change your life for the better in ways that cannot take place in any other experience, because it is through the life and mysteries of Christ's Church that we tangibly experience God.

This New Year's (September 1st), *gather, celebrate, and make new commitments* that will truly edify your life and benefit your soul. Complemented with an altar boy retreat, we will celebrate the Ecclesiastical New Year with the Divine Liturgy at Nativity of Christ, and you are invited!

May our Lord, Who was born in a manger for our salvation, bless this new year as we will continually *gather, celebrate, and commit* in His name!

As we prepare to launch our 2012-2013 Nativity Youth Religious Education Program (typically known as Sunday School), please allow your conviction toward the substance of this beautiful program to be strengthened by the following two quotes from **Saint John Chrysostom**, in guiding parents to raise their children in proper fashion:

*"Let everything take second place to our care of our children, our bringing them up to the discipline and instruction of the Lord. If from the beginning we teach them to love true wisdom, they will have greater wealth and glory than riches can provide. If a child learns a trade, or is highly educated for a lucrative profession, all this is nothing compared to the art of detachment from riches; if you want to make your child rich, teach him this. He is truly rich who does not desire great possessions, or surround himself with wealth, but who requires nothing...Don't think that only monks need to learn the Bible; Children about to go out into the world stand in greater need of Scriptural knowledge."* — Homilies on Ephesians, Homily 21

*"Never deem it an unnecessary thing that he should be a diligent hearer of the divine Scriptures. For there the first thing he hears will be this, 'Honor thy father and thy mother'; so that this makes for thee. Never say, this is the business of monks. Am I making a monk of him? No. There is no need he should become a monk. Why be so afraid of a thing so replete with so much advantage? Make him a Christian."* — Homilies on Ephesians, Homily 21

From its very beginning, the Nativity community has understood this experience of beautification as borne witness in our history: a beautiful location selected for the Church, a fervent intent to construct a permanent Church, the commissioning of a gifted iconographer, the consecration of the sanctuary, etc., etc., etc...

This Nativity experience of beautifying God's House continues! Through generous offerings by parishioners, we anxiously anticipate some new ecclesiastical items:

**New Altar Boy Robes!** Through the offering of John and Susan Stockton, we have ordered two new custom made sets of altar boy robes! The Gold/Gold/Red robes will be worn on typical Sundays, and the Burgundy/Gold robes will be worn during all Lenten periods. All robes are being hand sewn.

**New Exapteryga Set!** Through the offering of Spiro and Mary Kay Stratigos, in memory of Spiro's parents, Ted and Eleni Stratigos, a new processional cross & fans have been ordered. The set is currently being hand carved from oak wood and will have hand-painted iconography in their centers. The wood work has been commissioned to world-renowned Ecclesiastical Wood Carver, Mr. Kavroulakis of Crete, Greece.

**New Censor!** Through an anonymous offering, a new silver censor has been ordered and is currently being

customized before arrival to Nativity!
