Our natural relationship to God is one that is intrinsically a part of our design. To know, seek, and experience the love of God is the most natural state of being for all of mankind. As Saint Basil the Great articulates, the seed of this experience is natural, yet it must be cultivated so that we may maintain a healthy relation to God throughout the many stages of our lives -- the stages of life bring diversity, yet the one constant is our need to maintain connection to our benevolent God.

A Church's life cultivates our relationship to God, regardless of the stage of life, or how it is being experienced. Two chief experiences of the Church, which tend to and grow our relationship to God are:

- 1) The Worshiping Life of the Church
- 2) The Educational Life of the Church

First and foremost, Christianity maintains itself as a worshiping experience -- positioning ourselves to receive divine blessings through the Sacramental and Blessing services of the Church.

In order to adequately experience the worshiping life of the Church to the best of our ability, we must develop our intellectual understanding of the holistic experience of Christianity. Through God's design we learn each moment of our life. Through the experience of the Church, God's natural design is served by the offering of Educational Ministries. As we approach the Educational Life of the Church, I encourage the contemplation of two questions:

- 1) Am I currently an active participant in the worshiping life of the Church?
- 2) What is my current level of religious understanding/education?

The two questions are interconnected for Christians, and as I contemplate question #2 specifically, I think of the wise words of Socrates, "...as for me, all I know is that I know nothing."

We all can learn more!

At Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Christian Church, in the effort to offer a most accessible experience of Christian Education, a new parish education program is being offered to all faithful and friends - youth and adult alike!

September 8th, following the Divine Liturgy, a presentation will be offered to articulate the Nativity Parish Education Program, including program structures, premises and content. Also, please find introductory announcements in this edition of The Word monthly newsletter.

Nativity Parish Education Ministry

God has blessed us to learn every moment of our lives -- from conception, up to and through our death! The experiences of our life that embrace our learning nature are understood as *educational*. Nativity engages our learning nature through educational ministries, and we are pleased to announce the beginning of a new Educational Ministry!

The content of educational programs remains constant, regardless of age. That is, the total youth education curriculum will also be offered in the adult education curriculum -- taught at age-appropriate levels and pace.

Youth Religious Education

The Youth Education program will be offered in the traditional time of Sunday School, beginning immediately after the children receive Holy Communion during the Divine Liturgy on Sunday mornings.

Classical Education Model

The Classical Education Model has successfully existed for thousands of years, educating figures from Socrates to Thomas Jefferson! Built upon the recognition of natural learning capacities, a tier system of education is offered based upon age.

- Tier 1: Memorization
- Tier 2: Analytical
- Tier 3: Abstract

Built upon Classical Education theory, Nativity of Christ youth education annual themes are structured to embrace natural learning capacities.

The Three S's

The development of Orthodox Christian identity is the most valuable product of the Nativity of Christ youth education experience.

Three cores are offered at each grade level,

Scripture

Services

Saints

through which to learn subject matter in each weekly lesson. These cores are central to Orthodox Christianity and through their development create a lens of Orthodox Christian identity for our youth to understand and define themselves.

Annual Theme Curriculum

Each grade maintains an annual theme, which is broken into several unit themes comprised of weekly lessons. Due to current enrollment size of Nativity grade levels, grade levels are coupled, therefore annual themes will rotate by year in these classrooms.

Pre-K / Kindergarten

Pre-K & Kindergardeners will learn Christian principles through planned activities and fellowship. Parents are encouraged to communicate with staff as to how they may serve as teacher assistants.

Grade 1 ~ Saints

"The Holy Gifts for the holy people of God." First graders will learn the meaning and experience of 'holiness' through exposure to multiple individual and groupings of saints.

Grade 2 ~ Feast Days

Second graders will learn the Major Feast Days of the Church, along with several Minor Feasts. Through the study of the Church's feasts, exposure and insight is established into the life of Orthodoxy and its Scriptural foundation.

Grade 3 ~ The Old Testament

Third graders will learn the structure of the Old Testament, several Scriptural characters and the general messages delivered by God to mankind through His first testament.

Grade 4 ~ The New Testament

Fourth graders will learn the structure of the New Testament, several Scriptural characters and the general messages delivered by God to mankind through His second testament.

Grade 5 ~ Church History

Fifth graders will learn chapters of Church history through exposure to selected chapters of Christian experience, including: the Apostolic, Early Church, Byzantine, Persecution, and Modern eras.

Grade 6 ~ The Divine Liturgy

Sixth graders will learn the structure, practical and theological elements of the Divine Liturgy. Greater insight into weekly liturgical experience will become more significant in the growth of liturgical participation.

Grade 7 ~ Ecumenical Councils

Seventh graders will learn the chronology, participants and outcomes of the Church's Ecumenical Councils. Through this course of study, exposure to Christian theology is taught and made accessible.

Grade 8 ~ Sacraments

Eighth graders will learn the nature and experience of God's grace through the study of the Church's Sacraments. Through this course of study, exposure to Christian theology is taught and made accessible.

High School ~ Abstract Application

High Schoolers will cultivate their Christian identity through abstract development of group conversation in the following areas: Sunday Epistle Readings, Sunday Gospel Readings, Liturgical Cycles and Modern Orthodox Experience.

Activity Days

Apprenticeship & Fellowship

Quality education programs from antiquity and today maintain a component and experience of apprenticeship. Christian experience is centered upon the innate relationship we have with God. This relationship then becomes manifest in the relationships we develop with one another -- altogether comprising the greater experience of fellowship. The Nativity Youth Education Program facilitates the experience and growth of both apprenticeship and fellowship, most especially on "Activity Days." The First Sunday of each month will be an "Activity Day" where under adult supervision, high school students will lead activities with all Pre K - Grade 8 students.

Adult Religious Education

The Adult Education Program will be repeated twice weekly, once on a weekday morning, and once on a weekday evening -- in the effort to make the educational offering accessible to the majority of Nativity faithful and friends. In addition to everyone's personal Bible, all course materials will be provided.

Wednesday 6 pm & Thursday 10 am

A new topic will be explored each month, all taught with emphasis in the topic's association to Scripture, Church Services, and Saints.

September ~ Saints

"The Holy Gifts for the holy people of God." Participants will learn the meaning and experience of 'holiness,' through exposure to multiple individual and groupings of saints.

October ~ Feast Days

Participants will learn the Major Feast Days of the Church, along with several Minor Feasts. Through the study of the Church's feasts, exposure and insight is established into the life of Orthodoxy and its Scriptural foundation.

November ~ Old Testament

Participants will learn the structure of the Old Testament, several Scriptural characters and the general messages delivered by God to mankind through His first testament.

December ~ New Testament

Participants will learn the structure of the New Testament, several Scriptural characters and the general messages delivered by God to mankind through His second testament.

January ~ Church History

Participants will learn chapters of Church history through exposure to selected chapters of Christian experience, including: the Apostolic, Early Church, Byzantine, Persecution, and Modern eras.

February ~ The Divine Liturgy

Participants will learn the structure, practical and theological elements of the Divine Liturgy. Greater insight into weekly liturgical experience will become more significant in the growth of liturgical participation.

March ~ Ecumenical Councils

Participants will learn the chronology, participants and outcomes of the Church's Ecumenical Councils. Through this course of study, exposure to Christian theology is taught and made accessible.

April ~ Sacraments

Participants will learn the nature and experience of God's grace through the study of the Church's Sacraments. Through this course of study, exposure to Christian theology is taught and made recognizable.

May ~ Orthodoxy in North America

Participants will learn a general history of Orthodoxy Christianity in the New World, and the present structures and experience of the Orthodox Christian Church in North America, specifically as directly connected to the Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Christian Church.





MINOAN DANCERS FAQS



Q: Why Greek dance?

A: Greek dancing is great exercise! Since most dances are done in a line, dancers of all different ages, abilities and experience learn to work together. And when they master a dance, they know they did it as a team.

Q: Do you have to be Greek to Greek dance?

A: Not at all! A desire to learn and a commitment to rehearse is all that's needed.

Q: I've never danced before, what if I can't get it?

A: That's why we rehearse every week and review, review, review.

Q: What's so great about performing anyway?

A: Performing on stage, in costume swells self-confidence and it's easy because you're in a group and everyone relies on each other.

Q: I've heard it's really expensive to be in the dance group.

A: Tuition is \$100/year for one dancer in a family and \$150 if there are two or more dancers in the family.

Q: What about costumes?

A: The group provides costumes for all the dancers for \$50 per year rental fee.

Q: Do I have to attend the Folk Dance Festival?

A: No, it's not a requirement to attend. Many dancers practice all year and choose to perform locally.

Q: What is that Folk Dance Festival all about anyway?

A: FDF is a ministry of our Metropolis. It's held every February at a different location. It's a competition but mostly it's an opportunity for faith, fellowship, family, friends and fun.

Q: What about fundraising?

A: Everyone's help is needed at the Gyros booth at the Marin County Fair in July.



2013 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN



"Τὰ σὰ ἐκ τῶν σῶν σοὶ προσφέρομεν κατὰ πάντα καὶ διὰ πάντα."

"We offer to You these gifts from Your own gifts in all and for all."

In the Divine Liturgy the priest raises the bread and wine being offered to God, and announces to God that these gifts being offered to him, have been taken from the gifts that He has already given to us -- grapes (wine) and wheat (bread), both natural gifts from God grown in His earth! We then offer a portion of these gifts back to Him in the Divine Liturgy... for our own good! We offer God these gifts so that He may transform them into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, for our sanctification and healing of souls! So, to be clear -- in the Divine Liturgy, we take a small amount of what God has already given to us, and offer it back to Him, so that He can use it for our own good! This is the pinnacle experience and illustration of Stewardship offering! God has given us all that we have, either directly or indirectly -- yes, He gave you the ability and opportunity to develop your life, including your financial resources.
